I look forward to welcoming visitors to our city and to Australia for the World Rose Convention from the 27th October to the 3rd November, 2022.



Chaffey Rose Club 25th Year Celebrations

Well, what a whirlwind of 25th Birthday Celebrations we experienced over the September weekend! Such great friendships, laughter, and variety of experiences, all drawn together by our love of roses. It was wonderful to have Wendy Trimper, the Rambling Rosarian Bus Coordinator, organise a busload of members from Adelaide and Roses in the Heartland to support us in our celebrations. Others drove their cars and we very much appreciated the presence of Presidents Diane vom Berg, Mary Frick and Marjorie Todd. Of course, we very much missed our interstate Chaffey Rose Club (CRC) members from the Riverina and Sunraysia. When David Ruston formed our Club 25 years ago, we had no idea the COVID-19 (COVID) pandemic would result in closed state borders.

Our celebrations began on the Friday night, with a Meet and Greet and light meal in the lovely garden of Brad and Lorna Taylor at Paringa. On arrival, one could not help but admire the hedges and arches of *rosa Laevigata* (The Cherokee Rose which David Ruston so loved). This was complimented by several weeping bushes of white spiraea, among other roses.

Roses On Eyre 20th Birthday Celebrations

Roses on Eyre celebrated the club's 20th anniversary from November 5th to 7th 2021. A bus with 34 Rambling Rosarians from various country locations and Adelaide joined 16 local members for garden visits and celebrations.

The gardens were varied and very interesting. They included *Bostonvista*, where roses grow by the sea at Port Lincoln, and *Fiddlestix*, a garden at Coffin Bay, developed in limestone soil and a great example of perseverance, as the soil has been built up to retain moisture and fertility. This garden is interspersed with quirky oddments among roses, irises, salvias and hardy shrubs.

The third garden was at a funeral house on farming land. This extensive garden has many "rooms" featuring roses, hellebores, dahlias, cannas, and large shrubs.

Celebrations on Saturday night were held at The Grand Tasman Hotel, Port Lincoln, and featured speeches and messages from present and past office bearers, as well as items of interest from historical records.

Sunday began with a visit to *Glendara Rose Garden* at Koppio. This is a large garden in a paddock accessed by an unsealed road. It is most unexpected: as visitors "round" the corner, they are met by a field of colour.

There was a quick viewing of the silo art and then lunch at Tumby Bay. We visited a small but extensively planted garden there before visiting Sue Enright's garden at Cowell. Sue has been battling dry and extremely windy conditions and has lost many roses. Despite this, the surviving roses presented a colourful display. Rambling Rosarians continued onto Whyalla, returning to Adelaide on Monday.

It was encouraging to hear comments from visiting members about how amazed they were at the variety and high standard of all the gardens visited. It was unexpected to find such gems in paddocks!

It was a great weekend. Thank you to Wendy Trimper for organising the Rambling Rosarians bus. This enabled so many members to visit the Eyre Peninsula, and it was not locked down due to Covid! We will do it all again in 2031!

Uraidla Show

A small core of hardened RSSA exhibitors converged on the beautiful Uraidla Showgrounds on Sunday November 7th to stage a magnificent display of roses as part of that town's annual Agricultural Show. With an absence of several exhibitors who were attending the Roses on Eyre anniversary celebrations, those remaining doubled their efforts under difficult conditions to again make the rose section the highlight of the show pavilion.

One seasoned exhibitor claimed it was the most difficult lead-up to a show he had ever encountered, with wind and rain, heavy hail and infestations of thrips all challenges that had to be overcome in order to find blooms good enough to exhibit. As a consequence, quality of blooms was not as we would have liked, but full credit to the exhibitors for producing blooms at all!

Uraidla Spring Open Championship: Gavin Woods

Uraidla Spring Intermediate Championship: David Post

Rose of the Month



October – *Pat Austin (AUSmum)*, Modern Shrub

This rose was bred by David C. H. Austin (1926–2018) and was introduced in the UK in 1995 and in Australia in 1999 as **Pat Austin**. It was named after David Austin's wife, who was an accomplished sculptor.

David Austin's collection of over 240 English Shrub Roses captured the imagination of rose lovers worldwide with many rightfully taking their place among the world's most popular roses. He created **Pat Austin** from a crossing of **Graham Thomas** and **Abraham Darby**, both of these also bred by him. It was regarded as an entirely new colour breakthrough in English shrub roses, introducing an orange colour to the range for the first time.

Pat Austin has deeply cupped, bright copper blooms with a brassy-yellow reverse and long pointed buds. The flowers are medium to large (41+ petals) with a moderate Tea rose fragrance, produced either solitary or in small clusters.

The softly arching, hardy bush is well branched growing to 1.2m tall x 1m wide with good repeat flowering in flushes throughout the season.

For more than 20 years, **Pat Austin** has been a great performer with its heat tolerance and prolific flowering. Recommended for garden beds or containers and it looks very attractive as a 90cm standard.

November – *About Face (Wekosupalz)*, Grandiflora

About Face™ was bred by Tom Carruth (Weeks Roses) in the USA in 2003 and was introduced in Australia in 2007. It was named About Face because of its distinctive two-tone appearance, having orange petals with a darker reverse. It is registered as a Grandiflora, meaning usually a tall bush, derived from crosses of Floribunda and Hybrid Tea roses and characterised by blooms both singly on long stems and also in

small clusters on the same plant.

About Face™ is unusual among bi-coloured roses, as it features golden-orange upper and darker bronze orange-red on the reverse of the petals (26–30 petals), eventually fading to subtle pink and yellow. Blooms are medium to large, approx. 10–12cm in diameter, with a fruity apple fragrance.

Upright, well-branched and vigorous, this rose grows to approximately 1.8m tall with clean, semi-glossy foliage and good disease tolerance. But, watch out, it is thorny.

The bush has loads of blooms all season long. The large flowers, unique colour, fragrance and long straight stems make this rose ideal as a cut flower and also an eye-catching feature plant in the garden.

Rose of the Month

December – *Versigny* (Masversi), Modern Shrub

Versigny was bred by Dominique Massad in 1992 and introduced in France by Roseaie Guillot in 1998. It was created by the cross-pollination (or hybridising) of the two parent plants *Graham Thomas* x *Davidoff*.

This fragrant rose came about as a tribute to all those who love flowers and gardens, who come together from all over France and gather at Chateau de Versigny, near Paris, in October every year.

Introduced as part of the 'Generosa Collection', *Versigny* is a soft salmon pink apricot blend with an orange centre and its fragrance shows fruity notes of anise, apricot, peach, citrus and vanilla.



Versigny produces very full clusters of flowers which are cupped and ruffled with 26–40 petals. The bush grows to a height of 1.2m and width of 0.7m and blooms in flushes throughout the season. This healthy shrub rose has very good disease tolerance and thrives in our climate.

A worthy addition to any garden, putting on a good show especially when planted en masse.

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
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Wives of the Governors—General Rose

Lady of Australia is an Australian bred rose that made history when it won several important awards at the National Rose Trial Garden in 2018: Gold Medal as the best rose overall, Trophy for Best Rose of the Trial, Best Floribunda rose, Most Pest and Disease Tolerant Rose of the Trial, and the Australian Bred Rose of the Year.

For the first time in the Trial Garden's 22-year history, an Australian bred rose won the main awards, beating the strong international competition.

For all her awards and for being an excellent Australian creation, **Lady of Australia** has been chosen as the official rose to celebrate the wives of the Governors-General of Australia and it was launched on 11th November at the Government House in Canberra with an official ceremony.

Lady of Australia is also a Charity Rose, with \$2 from each sale donated to Australian War Widows Inc, providing support and advocacy for all war widows from all conflicts (www.warwidows.org.au).

Lady of Australia is a beautiful floribunda that produces clusters of classically shaped, bright yellow flowers, showing ruffled petals when fully opened, and fading to lighter yellow/cream on the reverse. The plant is healthy and highly disease resistant, very free flowering and fragrant, with dark green foliage on a well-shaped bush 1.2m tall and 1m wide.

This lovely rose was bred by Bruce Brundrett in Victoria, a well-known dedicated rose man who has spent his entire life in the rose industry. Bruce Brundrett commenced work growing roses in the family business in 1956. The rose nursery

in Moonee Ponds was established by his grandfather in 1893, and it evolved over the years to become S. Brundrett and Sons by 1961 and finally ceased trading in 2002. Thereafter, indulging his passion, Bruce became a rose hybridiser and is now recognised as one of Australia's most successful rose breeders, with many other of his creations receiving important awards.

Lady of Australia is introduced and grown by Wagner's Rose Nursery, one of the largest and longest-running rose nurseries in Australia, based in Kalangadoo – in the South East of South Australia – and growing roses for 70 years.



ESSENTIALS FOR ROSE GROWING SUCCESS

SUMMER ROSE GROWING CULTURE NOTES FOR SOUTH AUSTRALIA

Rose Society of S.A.

Roses will thrive in our hot dry summers providing we follow a few basic guidelines.

Summer in South Australia is generally hot, dry and sunny with very low humidity. The average daily temperatures in Adelaide in December are 26°C, in January 29°C, and February 29°C. These averages are lower in the Adelaide Hills, Lower South-East, Lower Eyre and Yorke Peninsulas and Kangaroo Island and similar or higher elsewhere in the State.

Of course, what these averages don't show are the very hot days and heatwaves we have during these months which can be very severe and savage our garden plants.

Rainfall, on average is also generally low in these months being 28mm in December, 19mm in January and 13mm in February. The amount of sunshine is very high, averaging around 300 hours per month. The UV readings are often high to extreme and evaporation rates, due to heat and low humidity, are very high.

So, what does this mean for our roses and how can we care for them during summer?

1. Watering

The most important ingredient for roses in summer is water. Generally, established roses need an average of 20 to 30 litres of water for each rose per week. It is essential that a rose is well hydrated prior to expected heatwaves, where the temperature is above 35°C on average. If severe heat is forecast in the week ahead, you should increase the rate of watering to 30 to 40 litres per plant. If a rose dries out, it is difficult to get it to recover quickly. It is recommended to apply the water in one weekly application or, at most, twice per week preferably early in the morning. Deep watering weekly is far better than small amounts daily.

These watering recommendations assume you have a substantial covering of mulch. Without mulch, you will need twice the volume of water per plant.

Finally, for those with roses in pots, a good watering (until it flows from the bottom of the container) will be required every two days. Try and shift or place your pots under partial shade during heatwaves.

2. Mulch

Mulch is the gardener's *best friend* in the summer months. A good layer of mulch performs three key tasks:

- Significantly reducing evaporation from the soil, saving up to 40% to 50% of the irrigation otherwise required.
- Cooling and maintaining moisture levels around surface roots (those in the top 10cm of the soil).
- Feeding the plant and enriching the good microbial activity in the soil.

Whoflungdung is a certified organic mulch from Neutrog which has revolutionised mulch



and its application throughout Australia. This mulch is biologically activated, nutrient rich and weed free. It comes in convenient 20kg compressed bales and can be taken to and easily spread where it's needed.

On rose garden beds **Whoflungdung** should be applied between 5cm (if topping up areas already mulched) to 10cm thick (if applying for the first time). It can be applied after pruning when it is easier to work around roses or in spring/early summer. Keep at least 10cm radius from the base of the rose. Apply water after application to settle the mulch in and reduce the initial odour which only lasts a couple of days.

3. Flowering

Providing the spent blooms were removed following the first flush in spring, another bountiful blooming period will coincide with the Christmas/New Year period.

Once this is over, we have two options. The first is to leave the spent blooms on the bush and reduce the watering a little, providing just enough to keep the plants alive, but not thriving – effectively placing them into a summer hibernation. They can then be stirred back into strong growth with an application of **Neutrog Sudden Impact for Roses** and a summer trim in late February or early March.

Sudden Impact for Roses is an organic based fertiliser recommended by The Rose Society of S.A. It provides a full range of plant nutrients in a slow-release form together with water-soluble nutrients to maximise performance.

The second option is to keep the rose flowering with continuous removal of spent blooms, with plenty of water and applications of liquid 'Sudden Impact for Roses' every two weeks in January.

It is to be expected that the flowers in January, February and early March will generally be smaller with less petals than are produced in the spring and late autumn flushes. This is heat related. In addition, due to high UV readings, dark coloured roses, such as red roses, can show scorched petals after very hot, sunny days. Like us, some roses can burn under these conditions. Temporary shade can prevent this occurring if desired.

4. Fertilising

If you want your roses to thrive during summer, an application of **Sudden Impact for Roses** soon after Christmas is recommended. This can be applied as pellets if you have a sprinkling system or as a liquid if you have drippers.

Any under-performing roses can be given an application of Neutrog's **GOGO Juice** every fortnight. This is essentially a pro-biotic for your soil and plants which is rich in beneficial bacteria and other microbes to assist in encouraging the plant to recover. If it does not recover, it may be near the end of its natural life and could be dug out in autumn to enable a new rose to be planted.



If you have put your roses into summer hibernation, start applications of heavy watering early in February and then fertilise with **Sudden Impact for Roses** in mid to late February. A summer trim should follow two weeks later to ensure the rose is set up for an abundant autumn flush in around 55 days after the trim.

A word of warning is required here because the operative procedure is summer trimming. It is sometimes wrongly referred to as summer pruning and the inexperienced grower must resist the temptation to cut too heavily.

5. Pests and Diseases

Given our hot, dry, low-humidity summers, most fungal issues disappear and pests such as Aphis and grubs also *back off*.

Spider Mite may be an issue and when present, lower leaves close to the ground may pale in colour. Remove a leaf, turn it over and watch carefully (a magnifying glass may help). If insects, the size of pepper start moving around and/or a fine web is evident, Spider Mite are present.

Organic oils (such as Eco-Oil or Eco-Neem) or one of the natural sprays (such as Natrasoap) can be used to control bad infestations – don't use strong, toxic insecticides.

Water sprayed upward from under the leaves can also assist with the removal of early infections. Spider Mite live under leaves and don't like to be wet.

Summer is all about the weather. Plan ahead based on the weather forecast for the next seven days in relation to watering and possibly using shade protection.

If you follow these guidelines you will continue to get the best from your roses.

THOMAS PROLL (Germany)

New Rose Styles – Unusual Rose Blooms for the Future

Thomas Proll was born in Barmstedt, Germany, not far from the premises of W. Kordes' Söhne that would, in time, become his employer. He completed his studies at the University of Hanover, where he qualified in Horticultural Sciences, producing his thesis on Resistance and Susceptibility of Rosa Species and Hybrids to Powdery Mildew.

Thomas has worked with Kordes Roses for the past 25 years. As head of the breeding department, Thomas has been responsible for the development of new garden cultivars and pot roses since 1998 and now concentrates on the breeding of garden roses. For over 20 years, Kordes have focused on producing highly disease tolerant roses and have had many successes at rose trials in Australia and around the world.



DIANE SOMMERS (America)

A rose grower for over 40 years, Diane's new garden in Wisconsin features more than 170 different rose varieties. 



Brian's advice to the home gardener on the watering of roses, was to saturate the surrounding area of the plant to ensure water penetrates deeply into the soil to reach the roots.

The bloom competition was judged by Diane vom Berg and won by Lois Hodge for the hybrid tea, Gaujard.

Our next meeting will be at 11am, Sunday 27th February 2022, at Woakwine Station, 509 Beachport – Penola Road, Magarey SA 5280. After our garden visit, we will travel 11km to Beachport and buy lunch at a licensed venue.

After lunch, members visited Sue Enright's large garden and were delighted to learn that her neighbour has started a rose garden as well. Sue reported that her own garden had suffered extensively from strong winds

and dry conditions over the last 12 months and she had lost many roses. Despite this, the surviving roses were looking healthy and colourful.

My View: Gavin Woods – 'Mentors'

Mentors play an important role in all aspects of life, not least of which is rose growing.

From the very beginnings of life we are learning beings; how to walk, talk, feed ourselves and develop into independent, fully functioning individuals. Those who teach us along the way become our mentors.

A true mentor is someone who takes us under their wing and shares skills and knowledge with us in a collegial way. Some mentors may not even know that they are functioning in that capacity; it may be that information is passed in a more passive manner but is readily received and absorbed by the learner.

Members of The Rose Society of South Australia have indeed been fortunate that many mentors have existed for those willing to learn. We have had strong administrators, expert growers and consummate exhibitors happy to pass their knowledge and skill to others. This has ensured a constant succession of experts to learn from.

The question is "Will this continue?"

The era of electronic information devices is upon us. People now source most of their knowledge from sources that do not involve an actual conversation. A quick search of the internet will reveal a plethora of documents and videos on just about every topic known to man, and more! The individual mentor has been replaced with countless experts of every shape and size; some offering factual and useful information whilst others less so.

Don't get me wrong; I am not a troglodyte bemoaning the advance of modern man simply for the sake of it, for I too use the internet daily and find it to be an extremely useful tool. Missing from the equation is the ability to have a face-to-face discussion and to question what is being fed to us; surely an important part of the mentor, student equation.

Many believe that in order for civilisation to endure and evolve, we must see a reversal of the current situation. One idea might be to formalise a mentorship program within our society. Interested members could apply to be paired with a mentor who has expertise in the member's particular field of interest. Those wanting to maximise their ability to grow fabulous roses would have a wealth of suitable mentors to learn from. Someone geographically close to their residence would be of most benefit, so that visits to each other's gardens could be considered. Those few with a penchant for exhibiting could likewise be buddied with one of our A Grade exhibitors, all experts in their field. Much can be learned in one to one sessions and continued to show day. I would see the mentor and the learner staging their flowers side-by-side at our shows, thereby swapping ideas on the best presentation of the learner's blooms.

Then there is the issue of administrators. It takes a very unique (some might say strange) type of individual willing to accept the rigors of a club executive position. There is no guide book to assist those new to these roles. It is usually

a situation where you *learn on the job* and can result in a *Baptism of Fire*. The American Rose Society elects their Vice-President who then automatically transitions to President at the end of their term. Three years of mentorship is then possible from the incumbent President; a very sensible framework in my view.

Suitable mentors represent an invaluable resource to our organisations with many eager to pass on their skills and knowledge; perhaps we should be utilising them more effectively?
