President's Report Autumn 2018 Doug Gregory



Summer

Summer is certainly a different season for rose growers and gardeners in general and to make this summer different from last year it has been particularly dry, with very few rain events and a run of days in the uncomfortable thirties. Provided the water is kept up to our garden plants they seem to survive and other than having a few burnt blooms and blooms with smaller and fewer petals, the roses remain

relatively disease free. This should bode well for the 'Autumn Show' as often these conditions will lead to a magnificent autumn flush. (Show details in this Bulletin). It's also time to be ordering and even buying new roses. If you are in this position, one variety to think seriously about is 'Unconventional Lady'. This is a pretty hybrid tea rose released as a fundraiser for the 2021 World Rose Convention.

World Rose Convention

A lot of work has been done to install this event on the world rose calendar and it will take a lot more to make sure it is of a high standard and appealing to all of



our members and general public. An event of this magnitude requires funding up front for hire of personnel, booking of the convention centre, printing, publicity etc. etc. We are currently in that phase of the event where the Convention Committee is actively seeking to raise funds. It seems that a chasm opens to swallow us up, but it is a National

event with all states being involved and contributing. When registrations from overseas and interstate start to roll in, the chasm will start to close and the gala show incorporating our rose show, plant nurseries and other allied businesses in a fantastic venue, will make it all worthwhile.

Member Activities

I know as a Rose Society Councillor for many of the years that I have been a member, that we are kept busy organising and assisting event coordinators. This also applies to the branch members who take on committee positions. But to me there should be an opportunity for every member to contribute something to the Society of which they are a member. The opportunities for involvement have certainly grown over the past 30 years, as has the size of the Society. The question really is, does everyone in the Society avail themselves of the opportunity to put something in? For those who do find it difficult to make some input, to attend a show or meeting would be contributing and you never know, you might find something you would like to do or offer up an idea that would make a difference.

To Councillors and committee members and members who help organise the show, monthly meetings and a sumptuous supper, branch activities, International Rose Garden maintenance, Rose Trial garden assessment, rose pruning demonstrations, distribution of Neutrog products, 'Bulletin' contributions and production, media maintenance and opportunities, exhibitor workshops, rose judging panel, guest speaking engagements, fund raising events etc. I encourage you to continue in the tasks, as you know as well as I do, that being part of a strong network creates lifelong friends and keeps us busy, and that fills a need in all of us.

Bulletin

As we become more familiar with digital technology, not everyone requires a hard copy of circulars, newsletters, newspapers or our 'Bulletin'. City Links

The importance of roses in the city square was brought home to members who attended the February monthly meeting. The Lord Mayor, the Right Honourable Martin Haese, spoke at length and listed all the nooks and crannies around the city that house roses. The order of 15,000 plants comprising several hundred varieties was mentioned.

President's Report Autumn 2018 (cont) Doug Gregory

The RSSA Inc. were also mentioned, more than favourably, in his address when opening the new Quingdao sister city rose garden to the west and near the Veale Gardens. (South Terrace).

The advent of this garden is a real asset to the city and may create more opportunities to expand our rose environment as Adelaide has five sister cities.

International Rose Garden (Botanic Gardens)

The rose garden occupies quite a large area of the park and has been a real feature for 20 years or so. Funding is being sought by the Botanic Gardens to have a major overhaul of the whole park, including the rose garden. As it is a large project, requiring a large budget, progress is made in small steps and it will take several years to see the full transformation. In the mean time, changes can be made to the rose garden that will fit within the grand plan and have it looking pristine for all who visit in the intervening period. To this end, poorly performing plants have been removed and some others removed to improve access for the members who help with the maintenance. More than 700 plants will be accessed for replanting this winter. This is a sizeable task which is being managed by Andy Hart of the Botanic Gardens in his usual efficient and effective way.

RSSA Inc Action Plan

Our RSSA Inc Council is pondering over a draft of an 'Action Plan 2018 - 2022'. If you have any ideas that will help direct our future activities, then, put it into print and pass it onto a RSSA Inc. Councillor for consideration.

is a large event on the Peninsular and we need people to prepare, to build, and take down the display.



CULTURAL NOTES FOR APRIL, MAY, JUNE

Gavin Woods



The cooler weather of Autumn produces the finest blooms of the year from our Hybrid Tea roses. Colour is more intense, blooms are larger with greater substance and the flush is predictable, based on the trimming date of our plants in March. This is the only time of the year that timing of our plants can be manipulated to any degree. Floribundas produce larger, brighter individual blooms but the clusters usually contain fewer blooms than with the Spring flush.

Miniature and Shrub Roses generally follow the lead provided by the Floribundas with smaller clusters and single stems of bloom.

A very light trim of some remontant types of Old Garden Roses will stimulate a repeat flush, albeit usually less spectacular than seen in Spring. Once flowering types are best left alone to develop plant structure in preparation for the Winter trim.

New foliage will return with vigour in April, leaving the tired and scorched leaves that survived the Summer hidden in their glory. The new reddened growth is a joy to the Rosarian's eyes.

If pelletised Sudden Impact was not applied in March, it should be done at the earliest convenience in April. The boost to growth it will provide will not be wasted; strong vigorous plants are a joy to prune. The use of Liquid Sudden Impact should be undertaken fortnightly. Keen exhibitor Tony Hanna has trialled the latter product for a few years and is full of praise for the benefits. I also recommend foliar feeding which mostly sees response in the leaves, so vital in winning top awards. An orchid growing friend, recently told me of the wonderful results received from foliar feeding his plants with Neutrog's Strike Back for Orchids. He sees lush growth and increased flowering. This product might be worth trialling on the roses.

It is very difficult to over-feed roses; gross feeders, the plants will lap up the nutrient and respond accordingly.

After a hot Summer and irrigation with Murray water, one often sees signs of nutrient deficiency and raised pH in our plants. Correct the deficiency as the new growth develops; failure to do so early in April will result in weak growth and poor flowers.

Now is your last chance to remove plants that have failed to perform and take valuable space in the garden, which could be better utilised by "something new". Unfortunately if you have procrastinated on a plant until now and expect to replant

in Winter, a lot of work is ahead of you! Remove the offending bush and along with it as much root- containing soil as is possible. This will ideally involve the removal of a wheelbarrow load of soil. Do not be concerned about neighbouring plants; their roots on the perimeter not disturbed will sustain them. "Rose soil sickness" is thought to be generated by dying roots that remain in the soil of the removed rose, so as many of these as possible must be manually removed. I have never been a fan of the "planting in a cardboard box" method sometimes advocated, and in fact have demonstrated time and again in my own garden that the simplest and surest method of replacement is to remove the old plant 10-12 months prior to replanting. There is then no need for removal of soil or chasing roots metres through the rose



bed. These all rot away if given enough time and with some basic soil improvement your new rose will prosper!

If, however, like most of us, you wanted to give the poor performing plant "one more chance" (I have dozens of those!) and have decided to finally wrench it from the soil in April, some vigorous and sustained soil replacement and improvement will need to be undertaken. Here, Seamungus and Go-Go Juice prove invaluable in stimulating soil microbial activity.



Water remains the most important factor leading

up to the April flush of blooms. If you want big plants with beautiful, bold flowers, water is the vital ingredient. I am not sure that you can overwater roses but certainly you can underwater. Twice weekly deep watering is ideal. Forget about rain. I rarely watch the forecast as it leads to gross disappointment! Our Autumn rains usually moisten the mulch and that is about it.

Spraying for pests and disease is a contentious issue, with every Rosarian proclaiming their own regime. If as forecast we are in for a warm and dry Autumn (but who can believe the forecast?) then there should be little fungal disease to contend with. I am in the fortunate position that Yorke Peninsula is generally warmer than Adelaide, has less rainfall and we are captive to windy conditions daily. These factors I believe help minimise fungal disease, to the point that I gave spraying away five years ago.

If you are game enough to throw the sprayer away, you might just find benefits of improved growth and health of your plants! For those not so brave, remember to alternate the fungicides used, as some groups of fungus can develop resistance to these poisons with repeated exposure. The main pest in Autumn are the cursed thrips! There is no preventative measure that I am aware of. To spray once an outbreak occurs will be ineffectual — the damage will be done. The only fail safe

measure to combat thrips is to grow a contingent of red roses; the damage done by this pest does not show on this colour. Earwigs, caterpillars and beetles can, on occasion, rear their heads; a bright LED torch is a useful device to check your plants in the dark of night. The thumb and forefinger are the best management devices for small populations of these pests. WARNING – do not let your neighbours see you creeping around, it will only reinforce their suspicions of your rose obsession!

The glorious rose blooms produced by the sweat of your labours need to be enjoyed. If picking roses for the home or more importantly for a Rose Show, cut early in the morning before the sun reaches the plants and plunge the stems into a bucket full of water. Remove the roses to a dark, cool place in the house or shed and allow them a few hours to condition prior to arranging them for the house or sorting them for exhibition. Floral preservative products added to the water might be beneficial in extending the life of the blooms; however clean chlorinated water works almost as well.

May is a month of relaxation in the rose garden. Little water will be required by the plants. Cooler weather and the end of the Autumn flush of blooms sees little stress placed on the plants. For those keen on dead-heading you should have plenty to occupy you. I encourage everyone to observe the benefits to your plants by simply removing the dead flower at the weakness that naturally exists within the stalk just below the flower. This can easily be done with thumb and forefinger (but perhaps not the hand used for earwig eradication), with the debris collected in an accompanying bucket. The benefits to your plants gained by the extra foliage retained cannot be under-estimated.

If you dabble in rose hybridisation, May is a good time to gather and process your seed pods (hips). It is also an ideal time to take hardwood cuttings of all types, particularly Miniatures. Again there are as many techniques as there are Rosarians; all will have some degree of success.

Make sure your orders are submitted to the nurseries for new plants. Many new release roses sell out, to avoid disappointment order early. Of course one can only properly critique the catalogues in the company of a really good Cabernet or Shiraz. I can at this point thoroughly recommend those offered by Patricks of Coonawarra, generously offered as a fundraiser to the NRSA for our 2021 WFRS Convention in Adelaide.



So to June......the ideal month to plant new roses. Sometimes it is difficult to get orders from the rose nurseries this early, but if you can so much the better. Plants home propagated and plants you have been holding in pots can go into the ground this month. Some Seamungus pellets in the planting hole will help stimulate the plant into growth. I also always recommend soaking bare-root roses for at least 24 hours prior to planting. The entire plant can be covered in water, it will assist in rehydrating the plant and encourage it to move into immediate growth once planted. I also try to water newly planted roses EVERY DAY for the first few months of growth. Again, do not rely on rain to carry them through. They will need more moisture than that provided by your irrigation system, remembering that the root system is initially non-existent and even weeks later very under-developed. Again too much water is hardly enough! Do not feed these new roses until well into Spring.

Another flush of roses will appear early in June, the fifth crop for the year. What an amazing plant the rose is. If we consider the effort required to produce hundreds of blooms per year for many years; the work of hybridisers long past is to be revered.

The final task for June is to apply Seamungus to your entire rose garden. Rains in July will carry this to the soil and a June application is ideal.

Finally do not be tempted to start pruning, remember the Rosarians dictum:

"To prune in June is much too soon".

ADELAIDE'S NEWEST ROSE GARDEN OFFICIALLY OPENED Melanie Trimper



The Adelaide – Qingdao Rose Garden, situated next to Veale Gardens on South Terrace, was officially opened on Sunday 25 February, 2018. The rose garden celebrates the relationship between the City of Adelaide and Sister City Qingdao in the People's Republic of China. Since the Sister City agreement was signed in 2014, the bonds of friendship between these communities have flourished on both an economic and cultural level.

The idea for the garden was first raised by Past Presidents of the Rose Society of S.A., Gavin Woods and Kelvin Trimper, who were at the time providing advice to The Right Honourable, the Lord Mayor of Adelaide Martin Haese and the City of Adelaide. Councillor for the City of Adelaide, Priscilla Corbell-Moore, was delighted when her proposal was accepted by the Council in 2016.

The garden was officially opened by Siping Cai the Consul-General of the People's Republic of China, the Lord Mayor Martin Haese, Councillor Corbell-Moore and other dignitaries. In his speech the Lord Mayor praised the warm and sincere friendship between both cities. He also spoke about Adelaide being the city of roses





with "approximately 15,000 roses, consisting of over 350 varieties, throughout our parklands and streets" and again reinforced the connnection with roses, confirming Adelaide will host the World Rose Convention in 2021, which will be another opportunity to showcase the City of Adelaide.

A beautiful statue, Song of the Wind, was generously donated by the Qingdao Municipal People's Government, to form the centrepiece of the garden. The original

version of this sculpture stands in the Little Qingdao Park in the City of Qingdao. The young girl, holding an ancient Chinese harp, plays the symphony of the city and the sea. The two statues symbolise the strong bonds of friendship between Qingdao and Adelaide.

In China, red roses symbolise "life and celebration" and so it was fitting that a magnificent new red shrub rose was selected and named 'City of Qingdao'. The rose was bred in 2005 by George Thomson, a renowned South Australian rose hybridist, and donated to the City of Adelaide for planting around the statue. This classic shrub rose produces large, deep crimson rosette-shaped blooms with attractive, leathery foliage. It is a vigorous and healthy shrub growing 900 mm x 900 mm and repeat flowers extremely well. There is a pleasant mild fragrance.

Mr. Thomson advised the 'City of Qingdao' rose is a new release this winter and is available from Knight's Roses, Wagner's Rose Nursery and Ross Roses. Gavin Woods said, "I have grown and trialled this rose for a number of years and I have been very impressed with its performance and quality of blooms. If you are looking for a good shrub rose, this one comes highly recommended".

PREPARING YOUR SOIL FOR NEW ROSES Reproduced with permission of Wagner's Rose Nursery

Now that you've ordered your beautiful new roses, you'll want to prepare the best possible home for them in your garden.


Soil preparation is a simple but important task, and a few easy steps will enable your roses to establish themselves happily.

Brian recommends that you first ensure the area for your roses is weed-free. He prefers to dig up any existing weeds and root matter rather than using chemical sprays that might leave residue in the soil.

Second, incorporate some organic matter in the ground. Something like pelletised blood and bone is ideal, and won't burn the tender new shoots of your newly-planted roses.

Remember, it's important to lightly dig the fertiliser into the soil; don't just spread it over the surface.

Third, give your rejuvenated soil a deep watering to soften the ground and encourage beneficial bugs and microbes to do their invisible work in the ground.



INFORMATION FOR ROSE EXHIBITORS Gavin Woods



Continuing a series of articles explaining the Standards, this edition discusses the Floribunda type.

What the Standard says/explanatory notes:

A Floribunda rose is a type of rose that normally blooms in a cluster. These are roses registered as Floribunda, Climbing Floribunda, Grandiflora or Climbing Grandiflora. It is important to remember that roses registered as Grandiflora or Climbing Grandiflora may also be exhibited as many other

types also (eg Exhibition, Decorative etc.) and if these are to be exhibited within this class, would need to resemble Floribunda type.

The most desirable Floribunda cut is one having the optimal number of fresh open and partly open flowers, characteristic of the cultivar, gracefully arranged on the main stem. Clusters containing few buds and blooms are as acceptable as larger clusters providing that is characteristic of the variety. We here reference the importance of judges understanding the habits of the varieties they are judging. Judges are ideally looking to award clusters containing all stages of development ie buds, full blooms and partly open blooms. Judges are often faced with Floribunda exhibits benched as "Stems" (ie one bloom with no buds). Whist some varieties registered as Floribunda will routinely produce "stems" they are not representative of the Floribunda type and should be severely penalised. This is more prevalent at Autumn shows where all Floribunda's produce much smaller clusters.

Freshness and brilliance of colour are important. Brilliance relative to the variety is required. If the variety is normally dull in colour, blooms displaying a true version of



the colour for that variety, would be highly regarded. Foliage should be clean and undamaged. Taking the time to ensure that foliage is clean and to tidy up any minor damage will be appreciated by judges. It is far better to remove or tidy up any faults in this area than to present an exhibit with damage. Faded blooms may be removed but untidy removal will be penalised. Untidy removal can refer to a length of stalk which formerly held a bloom remaining on the exhibit. A central bloom or bud is often

removed in the garden from the cluster; take care to ensure that any remains of stalks are carefully removed prior to benching the exhibit.

Serious defects include clusters with poor outline, blooms irregularly placed, crushed tightly together or so widely spaced as to show gaps, a high proportion of unopened or aged blooms, hips or stalks of spent blooms left showing, faded and damaged blooms, lack of open flowers. There is no requirement for clusters to be circular in shape. Symmetry can be recognised in clusters that are triangular, square, oval etc. Likewise the cluster could be linear (blooms carried down a length of the stem), and blooms can be at several levels on the stem (not held in a single plane). Symmetry and balance are two terms NOT used in the Standard but apply to cluster flowering type roses.

The pointing criteria are:

Condition: 4 points - We are looking for clusters that show the freshness and brilliance as described above. Many Floribunda roses are Single or Semi-Double in form. If stamens are showing there should ideally be no browning of these. There are secrets known by top exhibitors to delay stamens browning, please refer to your nearest A-Grade exhibitor!

Overall Beauty: 3 points - Here we consider the symmetry and balance of the Floribunda; also it's attraction with regard to colour and brilliance. Strength and purity of colour will attract points here.

Stem and foliage: 2 points - A relatively large number of points is allocated;

attention to clean and undamaged foliage is important as well as a balanced and proportionate, straight stem. As a general rule balance will be lost with a large cluster that is displayed on an overly lengthy stem.

Presentation: 1 point - Almost every exhibit should be able to attract the full point in this area. All clusters have a "front" which should be facing the judge. The cut should be well plugged or supported in its container so that it cannot move.

TIPS FROM SILKIE GARDENS ROSE FARM

WATERSHOOTS

You can trim a WATERSHOOT as it travels upwards! Obviously, do it before the flowers set and it will branch out a little lower down in line with the rest of the rose bush.

You could also put taller stakes in and when a watershoot like the one in the picture has already established and you missed giving it a trim, you can lightly tie the stem to the stake to preserve it in case of high wind.



YELLOW LEAVES ON THE LOWER PARTS OF ROSE BUSHES IN SUMMER

This is very natural at this time of year and should not cause concern or any need for spraying. During very hot periods, the water rises from the roots first to the very top of the plant. A vacuum created in the leaves due to transpiration needs to be filled first. The lower leaves, which are not very active anymore, are neglected in the water supply, turn yellow and eventually drop off – the rose stems have thickened and the attachment of the leaves is gradually severed. A bit like we lose hair and skin every day!



ROSE OF THE MONTH

JANUARY 2018 - 'Summer Memories', a Shrub Rose (Registered as Floribunda) was



bred by Tim Hermann Kordes in Germany in 1992 and was introduced in Australia by Treloar Roses in 2011.

Named Best Shrub and Silver Medal winner in 2010 at the NRTGA Awards and with many Gold and Silver Awards internationally, this rose is a proven top performer. It has been highly acclaimed for its quick repeat flowering, dense bushy growth, fragrant old-fashioned style blooms and excellent disease resistance.

Rose Breeders around the world have concentrated on breeding healthy shrub roses in response to a growing demand for nostalgic looking roses, which combine the qualities of old world roses with the repeat flowering, wide colour range and improved disease tolerance of modern roses. These shrub roses continue to increase in popularity around the world.

'Summer Memories' has large, creamy white cupped flowers (40 to 50 petals) with a light fragrance, produced in clusters of 4 to 6 blooms per stem. The bush has upright growth to 1.2m tall and 0.80m wide with healthy, semi-glossy, leathery foliage.

FEBRUARY 2018 - 'Sweet Intoxication' is an attractive lilac Floribunda rose bred



by renowned Hybridiser Dr. Keith W. Zary in the USA in 2008, using the Gold Medal winning rose 'Perfume Perfection' as one of the parent plants and Melody Parfumée ™. This rose was introduced in the United States by Jackson and Perkins in 2010 as 'Sweet Intoxication' and in Australia by Swane's Nurseries in 2012.

ROSE OF THE MONTH (cont)

'Sweet Intoxication' produces rich magenta blooms with a deeper colour in the centre, fading to lavender on the reverse side of the petals. This sweetly scented rose has an alluring, spicy clove fragrance – hence its name. The bush is tall and upright growing to 1.35m to 1.5m with healthy, glossy medium green foliage. A versatile rose, ideal for garden beds, mixed borders, flowering hedge or use as a cut flower, as the blooms are medium to large (average 10 cm diameter and 26-40 petals) formed in clusters of 6 to 10 per stem and have a long vase life. It is also suitable to grow in a large tub or patio container e.g. 60cm pot and it is great as a standard rose.

Troilus is an all-round good performer. It is easy to grow and makes an excellent

choice for group plantings and borders, try planting it in a grouping of three for more impact. It creates a wonderful display of roses from the first spring flush through to the end of autumn.

A good cut flower for arrangements. Its vase life is reasonable for a shrub rose, with blooms lasting 3 to 4 days.
